#1 Raise your VOICE


 Jaha Dukureh, UN Goodwill Ambassador and advocate to end FGM

- o "The campaign showed the magnitude and prevalence of sexual harassment, and also exposed the subtle ways in which this behaviour is normalized and internalized," Ana says. 
